successful book swap as well as supporting the parent 'taster session' where Mrs Turner shared her extensive book library and knowledge with parents. We are so very excited about our library revamp!




## ICEBERG ART


Took part in a record breaking Biggest Ever Football Session on with a significant number of year 3 showing 8th March 2024


